Forgiveness, Continued

Father was furious the night that little Laura tried to decorate a box with some expensive gold wrapping paper. But Laura was persistent. She brought the gift to her father the next morning and said, "This is for you, Daddy". Father was touched, but his anger flared again when he found that the expensive wrapped box was empty. He yelled at Laura, "When you give someone a present, there's supposed to be something inside the box!" The little girl looked up at him with tears in her eyes. "Oh, Daddy, it's not empty. I blew three kisses into the box—all for you, Daddy." Again, her daddy repented of his anger. He put his arms around Laura and begged her to forgive him. Laura died in a car accident shortly after the incident. Her Daddy kept that gold box in a special place. Whenever he was discouraged, he would take out the love he needed, a small taste of an imaginary kiss filled with Laura's love.

Everyone experiences the need to give and receive forgiveness at some point in life. Most people don't really know how to go about the business of forgiving. As bitterness wreaks havoc in their lives, many turn to professionals for help. In order to follow through with genuine forgiveness, we must be able to identify with the perpetrator on a human level. They, too, respond out of their own problems, pain, and fears, which lead them to the hurtful choices they make. Forgiveness doesn't mean that relationships must be completely restored or that a person won't feel angry about a sinful offense.

Forgiving involves several steps, such as recognizing that vengeance belongs to God; realizing that holding on to anger will lead to further damage to yourself; understanding how great God's forgiveness for humanity is through Christ; choosing to let go, interrupting destructive thoughts and putting productive ones in their place; turning to others for help in the process; and praying that God will give the strength and power to forgive.

Forgiveness takes commitment, focus, and dedication. No one who has ever walked the road will say it is easy. But in forgiveness, one exchanges anger, bitterness, hatred, depression, and perhaps health problems, for joy, peace, and freedom—not a bad trade by any standard. Forgiveness has long laid the foundation for spiritual well being in the Christian tradition. But scientific research now suggests that its healing power may extend beyond the sacred realm. Research shows links between forgiveness and physical and mental health.

We all know that this is nothing new. And yet, some of us have a hard time to forgive and forget when it happens in our own family. True forgiveness also involves a genuine concern for the other person. When Christ forgave His tormentors from the cross, He demonstrated this aspect of forgiveness. He also demonstrated it when He cleansed the temple. Of that occasion it is written, "it was not Christ's purpose to humiliate His opponents. He was not glad to see them in a hard place". (DA p. 594) The result of Christ's forgiveness of our sins is that we have the chance to grow "stronger in hope, in endurance, in character, and in the assurance of God's love". (SDA Bible Commentary v.6, p. 526)

When we know about the unfathomable sacrifice Christ made to forgive our sins, we realize that "we ourselves owe everything to God's free grace," and a feeling of humility for the grace that has been extended to us should motivate us to "let this grace be revealed to others". (COL p. 250) We should be humbled by the price God paid for our redemption. "Forgiveness for man was purchased at infinite cost, whereas it costs man nothing, except the sacrifice of some personal pride, to forgive others." Extending forgiveness to others affects God's forgiveness of us. He who is unwilling to forgive others does not deserve to be forgiven. Furthermore, to extend forgiveness to him would condone his own unforgiving spirit...only when we are right with our fellow man can we be right with God.



In the Kitchen - Soup

Posole

Soup

1 T. olive oil 1 ½ cup hominy, rinsed 1 can black beans, rinsed

1 cup yellow squash, julienned

1 cup onion, diced Garnish

1 stalk celery, thinly sliced 12 corn tortilla cut in strips 1 cup zucchini, julienned 2 cups purple cabbage 1 cup carrots, diced 2 cup tomatoes, diced 1 at water 1 cup green onion, sliced 1 cup radishes, minced 2 cups crushed tomatoes 1 cup avocado, cubed 1 cup tomato puree 1 cup cilantro, chopped 1 cup olives, sliced 1 T chicken-style seasoning 2 limes, quartered 1 t. chili powder 2 lemons, wedged ½ t. salt 1 cup cilantro, chopped

Soup: In a large pot, sauté garlic, celery, onion, squash and carrots in oil. Add remaining ingredients, except hominy and black beans and simmer until vegetables are tender. Add hominy and black beans just before serving to avoid overcooking. Fill soup bowls about halfway and garnish with baked tortilla strips and an assortment of toppings.

Tortilla strips: Prepare baked tortilla strips ahead. Stack tortillas and cut them into thin strips and then cut the strips in half. Coat a cookie sheet with non-stick cooking spray and spread tortilla strips out evenly. Bake at 250 degrees until crisp, turning as needed. Add any or all of above topping to hot soup. Squeeze lemon and or lime juice over entire soup mixture.

Yield = 3 quarts

Ribolitta

Ingredients:

2 Tbsp olive oil Salt and pepper

4 garlic cloves, chopped 2 cans sm white beans 1 medium onion, chopped 6 cups vegetable broth

2 carrots, peeled and diced 2 cups tomato sauce

2 celery stalks, chopped 3 cups stale Italian bread

1 dry bay leaf

Garnish:

1 small white onion, finely chopped

1 cup grated parmigiano-reggiano cheese

Directions:

Heat a deep, heavy bottomed pot over moderate heat. Add oil, garlic, onions, carrots, celery and bay leaf to the pot. Season vegetables with salt and pepper and sauté until they begin to soften 5 to 7 minutes. Add beans, broth and tomato sauce. Bring soup to a boil over medium high heat. Remove lid and stir in torn stale bread (crusts removed). Stir soup and incorporate bread as it breaks down. When soup becomes thick and bread is distributed evenly, adjust seasoning and serve the soup in shallow bowls. Adjust to desired consistency by adding either more bread or more broth/water.

Top soup with thinly sliced onion, drizzle of extra-virgin olive oil and a generous sprinkling of grated cheese.

Yield: 4-6 servings

Zesty Pumpkin Soup

Ingredients:

½ cup butter
 1 cup chopped onion
 1 garlic clove, crushed
 1 tsp curry powder
 ½ tsp salt
 ½ tsp ground coriander
 1/8 tsp red pepper
 3 cups vegetable broth
 1 ½ cups pumpkin
 1 cup half and half
 sour cream
 chopped chives

Directions:

Sauté butter and onion until tender. Add garlic, curry powder, salt, ground coriander, and red pepper then cook for 1 minute. Add vegetable broth and boil gently uncovered 10-15 minutes. Add pumpkin and half and half and cook 5 minutes more. Blend until creamy. May garnish with sour cream and chives.

Yield: 4-6 servings

Split Pea Soup

Ingredients:

1 lb package split green peas, sorted and washed

6 cups water

1 celery stalk, chopped 1 large carrot, sliced

1 large onion, chopped

1 bay leaf

1 tbsp cumin


salt

Directions:

Cook peas and water for 20 minutes, add celery, carrot, onion and seasonings. Simmer until peas are tender. Remove bay leaf. May blend soup or leave it as is. Add water for desired consistency.

Yield: 4-6 servings

Legend of the Candy Cane



According to legend there was a candy maker in Indiana who wanted to invent a candy that was a witness to Christ. He incorporated several symbols for the birth, ministry, and death of Jesus Christ.

He began with a stick of pure white, hard candy. White to symbolize the virgin birth and the sinless nature of Jesus, and hard to symbolize the Solid Rock, the foundation of the church, and the firmness of the promises of God.

The candy maker made the candy in the form of a "J" to represent the precious name of Jesus, who came o earth as our savior. It also represents the staff of the "Good Shepherd" with which He reaches down into the ditches of the world to lift out he fallen lambs who, like all sheep, have gone astray.

Thinking that the candy was somewhat plain, the candy maker stained it with red stripes. He used the three small stripes to show the stripes of the scourging Jesus received by which we are healed. The large red stripe was for the blood shed by Jesus on the cross so that we could have the promise of eternal life, if only we put our faith and trust in Hm. Sometimes a green stripe is added as a reminder that Jesus is a gift from God.

The flavor of the cane is peppermint, which is similar to hyssop. Hyssop is in the mint family and was used in the Old Testament for purification and sacrifice. Jesus is the pure Lamb of God, come to be a sacrifice for the sins of the world.

So every time you see a candy cane, remember the message of the candy maker: Jesus is the Christ!




Bible Secret Code – The Persistent Widow
