Nature of Our Youth

Our youth are vital to our church. We encourage their growth in Christ through loving support, fellowship, Bible study, and Christian service.

hurches all around us are dying. Most of them don't know it yet, but in a few more generations they will no longer exist. The reason is because there is a youth gap in their weekly attendance. At a certain age, young people usually stop attending. Then soon those who are still interested find other churches that are more attractive to kids of their age.

As the remainder of the church ages, the gap grows large because most who leave will never return. Soon there are few children who are younger than the gap, because the rest of the church has reached retirement (or grandparent) age. And then it is only a matter of time before the membership of the church sinks so low that the church itself dies.

Merrimack Valley is blessed with a vibrant Children's Ministry program. Our Sabbath School departments are bursting at the seams, but we cannot afford to be complacent, and satisfied with our progress. Researchers have found that Sabbath School is not enough to give children the best environment for faith development. Families get the best results when their children experience three or more church contacts each week. As a church we need to always think of ways to create these environments.

More than attractive programming, young people need opportunities and encouragement to develop habits of service. Even the slightest glimmer of interest needs to be encouraged. Those who have a job to do at church have an advantage that will keep them attending when other temptations beckon.

Those of us who graduated from the youth class many years ago have the obligation to create an environment of fellowship and loving support for the young people of our church. That means a willingness to sacrifice the perfection of our programming so that children can try something new. We need to partner with our youth, so that when they experiment with leadership, we are ready to help them succeed.

For our church to survive and be self-sustaining, we need young people! They are vital to the health of Merrimack Valley. If we are to grow and prosper, we need to offer opportunities that appeal to the young. We need to make sure that a generational gap does not develop within our church body.

Edgewood Elementary/Greater Boston Academy News

he students of Greater Boston Academy have been anxious for the beginning of "Let Freedom Ring!," a series of evangelistic meetings taking place this March. What is it about these meetings that's got them so anxious? Well, for these meetings, the students themselves will be the speakers.



The 14-part series is promoted as "a celebration of the great stories and timeless truths of the Bible, in the setting of America's culture and heritage." Pastor Skip Johnson, who wrote all 14 sermons, is organizing the meetings as well as prepping the students to do the speaking. Over 60 young people, including all EW/GBA students grades 7 through 12, and some public school youth at Lynn SDA Church, will be making presentations at four locations: Stoneham Memorial SDA Church, Lynn SDA Church, Greater Boston Academy, and Beverly SDA Church. Each student will read one sermon at one of the four locations.

Pastor Skip has worked with 3 groups in the past on similar projects, and says that every student participating is able to succeed "in what they are being asked and trained to do." The meetings are the primary project for the high schoolers' 3rd quarter Service Learning class, and the Bible outreach project for 7th and 8th grade.

"They are on the cutting edge of what we expect many other students and schools will be adopting as a regular part of our school life in years just ahead," Pastor Skip says. "[GBA students] will be able to say, 'I was with the first group that did it when I was in school."

"Let Freedom Ring!" meetings will begin on Friday, March 16 at 7:00 p.m. at Greater Boston Academy, Stoneham Memorial SDA, and Beverly SDA, and on March 17 at 11:00 a.m. at Lynn SDA.

Peanut Butter Fudge

c. peanut butter
 1/3 c. honey
 c. soy milk powder
 1/2 tsp. pure vanilla
 1/2 c. walnuts (chopped optional)

1. In medium mixing bowl, mix peanut butter and honey until smooth and creamy.

- 2. Add remaining ingredients, mixing well.
- 3. Spread in a 9x9 in. pan. Refrigerate until completely cold.
- 4. Cut into 1 in. squares and store in an airtight container.
- 5. This fudge can be stored in refrigerator for 4 to 6 weeks. It also freezes well.

Yields 8-1 in. squares

My purpose in writing this book is to place a message of encouragement and hope into a world too often filled with suffering, heartache and loss. I see this book as my own personal love letter that I pray God will use to touch the lives of those who read it with a special blessing.

I especially wish to reach those who are chronically ill as well as those who may be hurting emotionally or searching spiritually. My prayer is to convey that God is not only merciful, loving and forgiving, but is One who desires to have a meaningful personal relationship with each of us.

May my story of physical illness and my journey to know God reveal that He is indeed very real and very near to each of us. By God's grace, may I reflect that even in the midst of the darkest and most trying times of our lives, He gives comfort, peace and joy like no other.
