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Dear Fellow Christ Follower,

Jacob never listened to God~or to anybody else, for that matter. He was what we would call a "con man," guided only by his own guile. The name Jacob means "schemer."

One night while Jacob was sleeping, God spoke to him. Jacob saw a ladder, with angels ascending and descending—a vision of the kingdom of God. In that moment God Himself promised to be present with Jacob, to guide him and protect him.

Jacob was shaken. "How awesome is this place? This is none other than the house of God, and this is the gate to heaven" (Gen. 28:17, NASB). I think Jacob was staggered by his mindlessness. God was right there, speaking, and Jacob had not even known it. Jacob named the place Bethel, the "House of God." He took the stone he had used as a pillow and set it up as a pillar, an altar, to help him remember how close God was and how much he needed to listen.

"Surely the LORD is in this place, and I was not aware of it" (Gen. 28:16, NASB). Mindlessness is like that, not fully aware of what is happening in the present. Mindlessness is our mind's tendency toward mental drift. You know you've experienced mental drift when you're driving in your car and you don't remember how you got from point "A" to point "B." You're not sure how it happened. You just know you've missed something.

This can also happen in life; we go through life on autopilot. When we do, it becomes more likely that we'll miss God's leading, God's presence. Like Jacob, we experience mindlessness and fail to realize that the "LORD is in this place...."

The first key for living the guided life is to grow more attentive to God's presence. To help us, perhaps we could use a page out of Jacob's playbook. Remember what Jacob did? The Bible says "So Jacob rose early in the morning, and took the stone that he had put under his head and set it up as a pillar and poured oil on its top" (Gen. 28:18, NASB). In other words, to help him remember God's presence, he sets up a pillar as a reminder of how God had led him, and that He will lead him in the future.

We would be wise if we did the same. Whatever shape our pillar takes, may it serve as a reminder that we want to be able to say in more and more moments of life: "This is the house of God! This is the gateway to heaven!"

Leo Buscaglia wrote a touching book for all ages about this subject called The Fall of Freddie the Leaf.

Autumn also is a time to prepare for an inward journey and give time to personal reflection. I like to think that, just as the leaves fall, our own regrets and sadness can fall away from our inner trees, which are really ourselves, and be swept away by the invigorating breeze of renewed hope. We can feel lighthearted and happy again as we move forward toward the new year to come.

Remember the dance of the beautiful falling leaves and the lessons they teach of uplifting the spirit so that you can paint a picture of their glory to hold in the center of your heart all year long.

Mushroom and Barley Pilaf

Start to finish: 30 minutes

Makes: 4 servings

2 cups sliced fresh mushrooms

- 1 tsp. dried basil, oregano, or 1/2 tsp. of dried sage, crushed
- 4 green onions, sliced
- 1 6-ounce package frozen pea pods (I used fresh)
- 1 medium carrot, shredded
- $\frac{1}{2}$ cup pecan halves
- 1 T butter, or margarine, or olive oil
- 1 14 oz. can vegetable broth
- $1\frac{1}{2}$ cups quick-cooking barley
- 1 tsp. Vegex or George Washington Broth (2 packets)



In a medium saucepan cook the mushrooms, green onions, carrot, and garlic in hot margarine, butter, or olive oil over medium heat until mushrooms are tender. Stir in broth, barley, herb and Vegex if desired. Bring to boiling; reduce heat. Cover and simmer for 15 to 18 minutes or until barley is tender and liquid is absorbed.

Meanwhile, place frozen pea pods in a colander. Run cold water over the pea pods for 1 or 2 minutes or until thawed. Drain. If using fresh, place pea pods in saucepan and steam for a few minutes.

Stir pea pods into barley mixture. Cover and let stand for 2-3 minutes or until heated through. Top with pecans.
